I am advised that there are several histories used in the public schools of North Carolina now that ought to be eliminated and I call your especial attention to the list enclosed in this letter and the criticism concerning each one of these histories.

as you are I cannot tell a person qualified as a teacher how important it is that all objectionable books be eliminated from the public schools, and I believe that you can be trusted to see that it is done.

- 1. Adams and Trent- "History of the United States"

 Much advertised as being non-partisan, because of Northern and

 Nouthern co-authorship; but accepts Northern partisan view-point

 almost throu hout. Objectionable, with moderate circulation in four

 South, chiefly in private schools. Adams deceased, Frent vorn in

 Virginia, now professor Columbia.
- 2, Edward Channing-Students "History of the United States" Viciously partises and unfair throughout; yet had exceptional circulation, extending throughout the South. Calls argument of Southern Statesmen "ridiculous" &c,. %c. luther, professor of History at Harverd. Objectionable tex.
- J. A. B. Hert- "describle in American History"
- 4. Author, like Channing, professor at Harvard. Some improvement in Chancing in use of terms; but distinctly unfair in reasonin treatment, and diductions. Text has had very wide circulation. (Author's view, since publication of the text, amitt dly changed and more lineral). Tex objectionable.
 - 5. D.S. Mussey "American History"
 A recent test gaining phenomenal circulation. More attreactive styly than Hart or Chamning, but Equally unfair except in period of Reconstruction. Thanges Channing's "ridiculous" (see above) to "absurb." Calls Bouthern cause"unworthy" and is otherwise offensive and parisan. Author professor at Columbia University Objectionable.
 - 6. Anderw C. Mclaughliu "History of the American Hatlon"
 Partisan throughout. Expressions have caused its discotinuance
 in some schools.but still in use in other throughout the country
 Author, professor University of Chicago. Objectionable.
 - 7. S. C. Forman "Advance American History"
 A new history which accepts the false Channing-Hart-my Laughl interpretation.without, however, offecsive languages, a bit greater. Emphasis on western development. Bubtly injurious to cause of truth. Author born in Virginia. Object onable.text
 - 8..Wm. M Davidson -"A History of the United States"
 Language offecsive and unfair. False interpretation throughout
 Author, superintendent of schools in Kansas. Objectionable.
 - 9. D. H. Montgomery- "The Student's american History"
 Owing to attackts by S.C.V. and U.D.C. circulation has decreased greatly. Author prob bly unconacous of any bias.
 Objectionable.
 - 10.J. H. Lened- "History of the United States" Limited circulation. Partisan: Objectionable.
 - ll.Woodburn and Moran- "American H'story and Jovernment" Limited Circulatin. Incomplet and igorantly partisan. Objectionable.
 - 12. John Fishe- "History of the United States"
 An older tex and losing ground on account of suppse of unfairness. Nevertheless, treatment most liberal of any old style text except Mr Morrise, q.v. Objectionable.
 - 13. Charles Morris- "History of the United Atates"
 Authors view no: unlike Fiske's and less objectionable.

- 14. Nathaniel W. Stephenson "An American History"
 Author born in Ohio, new professor in College of Charleston. Like
 Forman (see above), author accepts the Hart-Channing-Mclaughlin

 perspective and proportion. Objectionable.
- 15. Beard and Bagley "The History of the American People."
- 16. Pro-German-Socialistic throughout, misrepresent the South. Very Objectionable in treatment of the negro question- All referred "Northern"- Book vicious and dangerous- see criticism already sent you.
- 17. Matthew Page Andrews- "History of the United States"
 Author non-pratisan of Northern and Southern descent, and presents
 sectional issues in new and convincing sense of proportion and
 perspective. Volume endorsed by high Northern and Southern authorities. (See Educational eport).
- 18., Jousins and Mill- "American Mistory"
 Authors of Southern orgin, with understanding of Southern
 Schools History of Northern origin, with understanding of Southern
 contentions as to salary. secession, State rights, self-government
 Somewhat partisan in period of the war between the sections.
 Acceptable. (see Educational Report)
- 19. On addition, there is a grammar school history by Miss Edna Turpin and one by Waddy Thompson; both of which, when in use in the high schools are acceptioable to patriotic sentiment.
